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






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History & Prevalence of Animal Bites & Rabies



Indiana History

- Until the early 1960s, most Indiana rabies cases were dogs, cats, and humans bitten by dogs/cats
- Vaccination requirements and animal control programs established
- 1960s-1988: Skunks

*

• 1988-current: Bats

• Last positive dog: 1989

• Last positive cat: 1984



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Prevalence

- Half as likely to die from a dog bite as from lightning strike
- Global rabies impact estimated cost: \$8.6 billion/yr
 - World Health Organization



- Pictures should include, at minimum:
 - Animal involved (for identification)
 - · Blood on animal involved
 - Wounds
 - Scene
 - · Containment measures of animal, if any

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IC 35-46-3-1 (Rabies vx)

Sec. 1. A person who knowingly or intentionally harbors a dog that is over the age of six (6) months and not immunized against rabies commits harboring a non-immunized dog, a Class C infraction. However, the offense is a Class B misdemeanor if the dog causes bodily injury by biting a person

- Document how you know the dog to be >6 months old
- Document how you know the dog to be not immunized



IC 15-20-1-4 (Off Property)

Sec. 4. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), the owner of a dog commits a Class C misdemeanor if:

- Fails to restrain dog, dog enters someone else's property, dog bites/attacks
- (b) The offense under subsection (a) is:
 - Enhanced: previous convictions, SBI, death



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IC 15-20-1-5 (Hybrid/Coydog)

- (a) Definition:
 - Parent A: wolf or coyote
 Parent B: another animal
 - Parent A: offspring of wolf or coyote/another animal
 Parent B: another animal
- (b) Requirements: Secure enclosure (or reasonable control)
 - Roofed or has sides at least 6 feet tall and constructed in such a manner that the type of animal contained within the pen cannot reasonably be expected to escape



IC 15-20-1-5, cont.

- (c) Subject to subsection (d), an owner of a wolf hybrid or coydog commits a Class B misdemeanor if the owner recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally fails to comply with subsection (b) and:
 - Fails to restrain animal, animal enters someone else's property, animal damages livestock or personal property
- (d) The offense under subsection (c) is:
 - Enhanced: previous convictions, SBI, death



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IC 15-20-1-3 (Civil Liability)

Sec. 3. (a) The owner of the dog is liable for all damages suffered by the person bitten if a dog, without provocation, bites a person:

- Who is acting peaceably and legally permitted to be there
- (b) The owner of a dog described in subsection (a) is liable for damages even if:
 - No previous incidents or the owner has no knowledge of prior vicious behavior by the dog

 Sec. 1. If a dog kills or injures any livestock...the owner or harborer of the dog is liable to the owner of the livestock for all damages sustained, including reasonable attorney's fees and court costs

IC 15-20-2-2

 Sec. 2. A person who observes a dog in the act of killing or injuring livestock may kill the dog if the person has the consent of the person in possession of the real estate on which the dog is found



IC 35-46-3-5 (Destruction)

(10) Destruction of a vertebrate <u>animal</u> that is:

- (A) endangering, harassing, or threatening livestock or a domestic animal; or
- (B) destroying or damaging a person's property



(15) Humane destruction of an animal that the person owns



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IC 25-38.1-4-5.5 (Vet Records)



(e) An animal's veterinary medical records and medical condition must be furnished within five (5) business days without written client authorization under the following circumstances:

- (5) As a part of an animal cruelty report and associated applicable records that are part of an abuse investigation by law enforcement or a governmental agency
- (6) To a law enforcement agency as part of a criminal investigation



IC 15-20-1-6 (Police Dogs)

Sec. 6. An owner of a dog is exempt under section 4 of this chapter if the dog commits an act described in section 4 of this chapter during the period that the dog is owned by:

- (1) the United States;
- (2) an agency of the United States; or
- (3) a governmental entity (as defined in IC 34-6-2-49); and the dog is engaged in assisting the owner or the owner's agent in the performance of law enforcement or military duties



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




(Dr. Ian) Dunbar Dog Bite Scale







Levels 2-5

- Level 2: Skin-contact by teeth; no punctures
- Level 3: one to four punctures from single bite, not deeper than half the length of canine tooth
- Level 4: one to four punctures from a single bite, at least one deeper than half the length of canine tooth
- Level 5: multiple bites, multiple-attack



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Levels 1 and 6

- Level 1: obnoxious or aggressive behavior but no skin-contact by teeth
- Level 6: death



ALBION - The German shepherd/pitbull/Labrador mix named Loki had bitten three children under the age of 9, its owner allegedly admitted to police, between Dec. 9, 2021, and Jan. 3, 2022.

On March 1, that same dog bit a 4-year-old girl in the face in their LaOtto home. The bite was so severe, the girl's teeth were visible in the hole in her cheek. She had to be rushed to Parkview Regional Medical Center for emergency surgery.

The girl has since been released from the hospital.

On Monday, the owner of the dog, Joseph A. Loy, 33, of LaOtto, was arrested at 10:08 a.m. by Noble County police on a warrant charging neglect of a dependent resulting in serious bodily injury, a Level 3 felony; neglect of a dependent, a Level 6 felony; and harboring a non-immunized dog, a Class B misdemeanor.



Davis v. Evansville

- Davis (juvenile) was attacked by a dog when he was outside with a friend and her dog
- Witness recognized attacking dog to be the dog she had reported to Evansville AC multiple times for being loose/vicious; AC did drive-by
- A dog with the same name/breed had bitten another juvenile ~6 months prior and had been held by AC but unconfirmed to be the same dog
- Davis sued claiming failure to act/breach of duty



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Davis v. Evansville, cont.

- Trial court ruled ACOs had "law enforcement immunity" under Indiana Torts Claim Act
- Court of Appeals reversed
- Reversed and remanded: ACOs did have "law enforcement immunity"
